How Can I Begin to Advocate?

How to Advocate at the Local Level:

1. Host BHSM at your school.

- a. Interactive bulletin board: Ask the SLP, etc.
- b. Make a visual display of various methods of communication (speaking, AAC devices, ASL, etc.)
- c. Email quizzes via Google Forms (winner gets chocolate!)

2. Host a PD session at your school/district.

- a. What's something your teachers need to know?
 - i. Referral process
 - ii. Evaluation/eligibility process
 - iii. Artic, language, and fluency classroom strategies
- b. Team up with other educators or service providers!

3. Write a grant (AAC device, iPad, a training/certification, assessments).

How Can I Begin to Advocate?

How to Advocate at the State Level:

- 1. Join your state association.
 - a. Your state association advocates for you at the state level. They meet with legislators to speak on your behalf for the needs of the SLPs and AUDs across your state.
